FOCUS MEETING Sunday, Sept 30 7pm, The Chapel



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The world of Baptist cooperative agencies can be a complicated one, especially for those who have never taken time to consider them. Almost every year, two of the national agencies find themselves in the headlines for some decision or move that generates controversy and debate. But apart from those moments, Baptist agencies at the local, state, and global levels, more often than not, fly under the radar.

This is a somewhat sad development to me because the cooperative spirit of Baptist churches has traditionally been one of our denomination's strongest qualities. Early on in American Baptist history, this recognition was a major calling card of Baptists: that we can accomplish more in our work for God's Kingdom when we share our resources and partner together than any one of our churches can alone.

At UBC, we continue to work cooperatively with Baptist churches close to home and around the world. In the greater Houston area, we are strong partners with the Union Baptist Association, an organization with more than 560 churches. You can learn more about our association at ubahouston.org. In the state of Texas, we partner with the Baptist General Convention of Texas (texasbaptists.org), and nationally we partner with two organizations, the Southern Baptist Convention (sbc.org) and the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship (cbf.net). Each of these entities represents a unique group of Baptist families of faith seeking to wrestle with issues of our day and to promote mission work around our state, country, and world. They are all diverse, just as we in our church are diverse. And they all promote the gospel of Jesus Christ, the autonomy of local Baptist churches, and the missionary mandate to go and proclaim the good news to the ends of the earth.

This summer, I received an invitation to attend the annual meeting of the global equivalent of these Baptist cooperative agencies, the Baptist World Alliance (bwanet.org). UBC has long been a church with a global heart, global partnerships, a local multicultural makeup, and a sensitivity to the gospel of Jesus manifesting itself in culturally nuanced ways around the world. I was intrigued to learn more about this organization that brings together Baptist leaders and church members from approximately 125 countries and territories, made up of over 160,000 churches that contain almost 48 million Baptists.

The Baptist World Alliance, as I learned at this conference, helps Baptist churches around the world share resources and work in five key areas of ministry: promoting worship, fellowship, and unity; leading in mission and evangelism; responding to people in need; defending human rights and justice; and advancing relevant theological reflection. If you compare that list of initiatives with UBC's areas of local and global service, I think you will find a lot of overlap: promoting worship and fellowship by building worship centers for Navajo churches; responding to people in need by local mentoring, drilling wells in Central America, and other initiatives; and advancing theological reflection by offering training for church leaders and teachers in the Dominican Republic, South Africa, Thailand, and the Philippines, just to name a few. I was greatly encouraged, and hope that you will be too, at the prospects of getting to know better and work with more closely our brothers and sisters in churches around the world.

Every five years, BWA holds a global Congress, where Christians and church members from all over the world join together for worship, missions, fellowship, and celebration. From July 22-26, 2020 this event will take place in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. I am planning to attend and hope to experience this event with a number of members of our UBC family. If you have any interest in learning more about BWA, or any of our partner organizations, I would encourage you to read up on them using the links in this article. You might even sign up for the BWA newsletters or general news feed to stay abreast of what member churches are doing here in Texas and every corner of the world where Christ's name is exalted.

As I write this, I'm sitting at Makiling Conference Center in the Philippines. A group of six UBC'ers is here working with pastors and children workers from six village churches. Worship on Wheels (WOW), a UBC ministry conceived and operated by our own Troy and Thai Beaver, have held VBS-style events at each of their locations.

When working with the pastor breakout sessions, each one talks about the significant increase in children's attendance after WOW's visit. So significant of an event that they traveled 10 to 12 hours by boat, bus, and jeepney with their children's workers to attend the conference. The conference is underwritten by the UBC mission funds, individuals sponsoring ministry kits and sound equipment, and the team members' contributions.

Two things strike me here. The first is the Kingdom results of one couple with a vision and the audacity to step into it. Early retirement from the fire department for Troy, married to a native Filipino Thai, who has a heart for her people, adds up to a mighty weapon in God's hand. Secondly, that God, in his infinite wisdom, immerses them into a group of people gathering at a place called UBC, who are Becoming a Family of Christ Followers. WOW is now sponsored, encouraged, and supported in such a way that they are Connecting People to God's Kingdom. A great picture of God's economy.



And this is just one of many stories of God's people having Kingdom impact through their obedience to their calling. As you read the Focus reports, enjoy the God stories behind each report, article, and picture. They weave a beautiful mosaic.




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7. Huge dust storm on the way home around Amarillo.

It truly takes the whole church family to have a hand in the success of these trips and I greatly appreciate your help. Pastor Joel and Fabiola Haynes are very grateful for UBC's gift of a new building for Strong Hold Baptist Church as are the people of Pinon.

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The House I A

Lora Doremus, director of women's ministries. shares stories from her thought-provoking trip to LA in partnership with The House LA church. Read excerpts below and go to ubc.org/ubc-life to read all the stories.





WEDNESDAY

On Wednesday, we visited the Union Rescue Mission (URM) in downtown LA. This huge mission has been in operation since 1891. In the beginning, they utilized a "Gospel Wagon" to ride around picking up any who were willing to receive help. Some think that this is the origin of the phrase "I fell off the wagon." Today URM sleeps over 1,000 people per night. The need has gotten much worse lately because of skyrocketing rents. At the moment, they are hosting ten single fathers with children. 90 mothers, and over 220 children.

> There is some paid staff, many resident work-as-therapy workers, and tons of volunteers. One church in Englewood has an office at URM, to do the ministry of presence. We got to hear some of the stories of redemption. There are no words.

At the moment, they are hosting ten single fathers with children, 90 mothers, and over 220 children.

URM serves meals 12 times per day. Starbucks provides every item they offer for breakfast every single day. The mission provides haircuts, free dental services, spiritual and job coaching, classes, health and hygiene care. One man who graduated from the program, healthy, whole and ready for work but he never smiled. His countenance seemed so low and serious. But since URM has learned that the last door to openness is often someone's smile, they gave this man free dentures.



He now smiles broadly to everyone. He seems like a completely new person.

THURSDAY

Today we took a tour at Homeboy Industries, founded by Jesuit priest Father Gregory Boyle. Homeboy Industries is a gang-intervention program located in Boyle Heights (no connection), the gang capital of the world. It is a self-sustaining business, bakery, cafe and job source. Look on Netflix for a wonderful documentary about Father Greg called "G-Dog."

SATURDAY

The word got out that we were going to be doing a clean-up around the church today. A Korean Youth organization provided the tools and bags, and the city sent a representative from the sanitation department. We had to be trained because the trash in the streets around there includes syringes, human waste and other forms of biohazards. The young people that participated were amazing hard workers. A grad student from USC showed up to interview us about our thoughts on "Zero Waste" culture. She interviewed me, and I had to confess that I'm from Texas and we definitely lag behind California in stuff like that. I had never even heard the term "zero waste" before.

She was amused by me. I kept talking about the people, and she kept patiently steering me back to her subject. I'm going to end up on the editing room floor.



Every evening our team has tried to meet under the trees at the place where we're staying (William Cary International University). We download the day and try to think about what to do with all that we're learning. Louis and Anna said a lot about how our mere presence here is such an encouragement to them.

The fact that we cared enough to come out here and join them, see their work, pray with them and help for a few days meant the world to them. I am not the same person I was when I arrived. I remember all the stories: Alex, Robert, Michael, LaPaul, Levi....

Several years ago, some UBC members had an idea: to have UBC partner with STCH Ministries for a Family Mission Trip to the Dominican Republic. Through God-orchestrated events, the first trip happened in 2014. This summer marked our fifth year of visiting the DR for our family mission trip.

With each trip, UBC and our VBS kids & families come together to fund projects to help the children in the DR. The kids in Children's Ministry will tell you that they are a part of everything that is done in the DR. Whether they go on the trip or not, they are invested and care about helping the children at the orphanage.

This year's trip started in the city of Santiago where the team spent three days at the Mercy Network Orphanage. Our theme for the week was being a new creation in Christ. This theme was taught to the children by explaining how a caterpillar is transformed into a beautiful butterfly. We had a great time showing the children the love of Christ through playtime, recreational games, crafts, and nightly parties. In addition to spending time with the children, we built two playhouses: a workshop complete with toy hammers, saws, and measuring tapes; and a kitchen with plastic fruits, vegetables, pots and dishes. Out on the recreation field, we painted a mural with a big colorful butterfly and the verse "De modo que sit alguno esta en Cristo, nueva criatura es..." 2 Cor. 5:17.

Lastly, we had the opportunity to provide training to the orphanage caregivers. We gave them practical strategies to interact with children who have experienced trauma and help them feel safe. We showed the caregivers how valuable they are in the lives of the children and how precious they are in the eyes of God.

After our time at the orphanage, we traveled to Santo Domingo and had a beautiful day taking UBC Samuel's Fund Children to the aquarium. This outing, as well as those in past years, gives us the opportunity to build lasting relationships with the children who are sponsored by UBC families.



Whether we are working with the children at the orphanage, teaching caregivers, or taking children on an outing, our goal is for everyone to know they are loved and valuable. We are blessed to be a part of the work that God is doing in the Dominican Republic.




Silver Cliff

Thoughts from Africa: Kyle Wilson

So you're ready to come to Africa?! Here's what you need to expect.

Heart-wrenching stories of women and children being raped.

We can talk a lot about attitude, how to treat other people, and also talk about loving Jesus. Preschool Ministries

Right at Home Moms - Summer 2018

Our summer semester, June 20 – August 15, brought 18 moms studying Motivate Your Child. "Internal motivation comes from the heart, but just because something comes from the heart doesn't make it good. That's why God designed two things to keep the heart going in the right direction: the conscience and the Holy Spirit," says authors Dr. Scott Turansky and Joanne Miller, RN BSN.

Each Wednesday morning, the group learned specific tools and ideas to help their children build internal motivation to do what is right. Children, ages 3 years-5th grade, who attended Kingdom Care while their moms participated in the group study, had a unique curriculum of their own: Hero Training Camp. This support material used the life of David to teach kids that God has provided them with the standard equipment to be heroes in training now. Fun crafts, energizing games, science experiments and role plays helped to teach the children to be internally motivated.

The summer semester also allowed time for play dates, a Mom's Night Out, and an end of the semester pool party.

Right at Home Moms is a family ministry of UBC designed to support mothers of infants, toddlers, and preschoolers who are modifying their work schedule or leaving the workplace to stay home and raise their children. Our goal is to help new moms find practical Bible study, genuine encouragement, time to refresh their spirit, and a network of Godly friends in a similar phase of life. We believe that motherhood is the hardest but most fulfilling work you'll ever find!

Popsicles on the Playground

It was fun while it lasted! The rains held off for most of the event, on May 23, before the 130 parents and children scattered to their cars. No worries - the kids were in their swimsuits!

Popsicles on the Playground is full of water play – small wading pools, bubbles, a tropical slip 'n slide, and a giant water slide for the most daring preschoolers. It's a hard choice to make between red, orange or purple popsicles, and then it's off for more water fun, colorful sidewalk chalk, and riding tricycles on the playground's bike track. Popsicles on the Playground also provides parents a chance to visit with one another, making it the perfect play date.

Ready, Set, Go!

Preschool Ministries began the summer with a family mission focus. Ready, Set, Go! gives families an opportunity to serve in simple ways during June, July and August.

Our kickoff begins in early June with collecting non-perishable food items for the Clear Lake Food Pantry. Several boxes of canned goods were delivered later that month by our Kindergartners during our mission camp, KJOY.

July 7 brought the perfect overcast summer day for Popsicles in the Parks. Families were encouraged to play at their favorite park and share popsicles and water with others who had come to play. "I liked meeting new people," said Alexis Clark, age 4. "And, I had an orange popsicle at the park!" Later that evening, we joined together at UBC's playground and enjoyed grilled hot dogs, chips and lemonade for dinner.

Lighthouse Christian Ministries was our service project on August 4. Families purchased specific items to make bags and help feed the homeless. Six families attended. sorting and organizing before placing each item in the bag. Children and parents also created cards with colorful pictures, sweet thoughts and prayers. "When UBC came last summer, we gave a bag to a homeless man who comes in often," stated Tammy Eckart, LCM's Operation Director. "The next time this man came in, he commented on the card in his bag. He was touched that a child had made that card for him, and his life is now turned around."

When asked about her favorite thing she did for someone else this week, Kindergartner Nicole Ritz answered,

"making blankets." Our group tied 24 fleece blankets with fun designs and donated them to Texas Oncology in Webster. We later learned ALL the blankets had been given out to chemotherapy patients to use during their treatments to keep them warm. Mercedes King's favorite thing was singing at the cancer center. The patients in the lobby welcomed these sweet voices with lots of smiles and clapping.

> Several KJOY campers said their favorite opportunity to serve others was painting ceramics with the elderly residents at Heartis Assisted Living. We also hung brightly colored door hangers on the residents' doors. The children then sang a few songs with the grand finale of Happy Birthday to KJOY participant Coraline Johnson's great-grandmother who was celebrating her 96th birthday.

A favorite of Lyle Tucker's was making snack bags for the homeless. Filled with peanut butter crackers, granola bars, fruit cups, mints, water, and a handwritten prayer by the children, they were encouraged to keep the bags in the car to hand out when seeing someone in need.

Our last day was spent at Clear Lake Regional Hospital where we gave out busy bags to children in the hospital. The busy bags contained fun things such as puzzles, activity pages, crayons, playdough and candy. We then headed to McDonald's to finish out a perfect week! Yourself last – where the children enjoyed playing and eating with their friends.

Proposed Fiscal Year 2019 Budget

As we close FY2018, we will have seen many longawaited projects come to realization:

- The remodel of the Children's Ministry area is complete,
- Our Pavilion has been dedicated and is in full use,
- The Mission Training Center will be completed before year end,
- Modest improvements to the foyer have been completed.

In response to the devastation of Hurricane Harvey, UBC cooperated with many area churches to minister to thousands of families and mud out or repair thousands of homes. God's Kingdom has been advanced in the midst of great trials for so many people, allowing them to be connected with His Kingdom.

Ministry initiatives have launched and continue to help us grow as a Family of Christ Followers. These include the Spanish ministry, Faith at Home initiatives, and the continuation of local partnerships.

It is with gratitude and confidence that the Executive Council is proposing a 1.8% increase in the budget to fully fund UBC's ministry efforts for FY2019. Since the Lord provided a budget surplus for FY2018, the FY2019 proposed budget is less than anticipated FY2018 income. Though the increase is modest, there has been a considerable amount of budget restructuring with personnel changes and new ministry objectives. This proposal also represents a fourth straight year of increased ministry funding, although the overall budgets have remained flat during this time. Detailed budget allocations will be available at the Budget Review Meeting.

The budget details will be explored at the Budget Review Meeting on September 23rd at 7:00 in the Chapel. The Focus Meeting on September 30th will be a vote on the budget with minimal discussion.

Please be in prayer for good stewardship as well as for the plans God has for us.

UBC Foundation Reports

Thailand

Every time I go to Thailand I'm struck by both the kindness and hospitality of the local people mixed with the incredibly challenging environment for Christians and churches to operate and thrive. Most pie charts that depict the statistics of religious groups in the country look remarkably like Pac-Man (especially when the color yellow represents Buddhism). Estimates range anywhere from 93-96% of the country's residents who identify with the national religion. Of the remaining populace, 4-5% identify as Muslim and less than 2% identify as Christian. Our Christian friends there are not only faced with being a drastic religious minority, but also the majority religion is generally viewed as part of the fabric of national and cultural Thailand.

My relationship with one Baptist church in the northeastern city of Udon Thani was formed through a mutual connection who is a former UBC family. A second former UBC family is now members of this church also. The pastor of their church is a well-respected and widely connected Christian leader in all of Thailand; as well as in the greater Southeast Asian Christian community. Through his friendship and leadership, UBC partnered this past June to provide a 3-day Pastor's theological conference. These types of training opportunities for small, often bi-vocational, pastors are vital to their spiritual development. Many of them live in family, work, and church environments where full-time theological education is challenging or even impossible. And so the extent of theological training they receive comes from opportunities just like this.

On June 7-9, 32 Christian leaders from NE Thailand and Laos gathered at a retreat center for three days of training and education pertaining to the biblical interpretation, ministry application, and preaching of the first five books of the Old Testament, Genesis through Deuteronomy. A grant from the UBC Foundation entirely funded the conference. For us, the initiative is not simply in providing a retreat, but in making a lasting investment in the theological education of Christian leaders, both paid and volunteer, women and men, young and old. Our hope and prayer are that investment in each of those leaders is a long-term investment in each of the churches where they serve. That God will take UBC's time, money, and love for God's Word, and multiply it over and over again in the work and ministry of these numerous communities of faith seeking to connect people to God's Kingdom in places you and I will never go.

Please pray for these churches, their pastors and lay leaders, and their church members. Pray that their efforts to share the gospel in their communities will be effective and fruitful. Pray that the Lord will continue to provide for all their needs, financial, material, and spiritual. Thanks for allowing me the time to be gone and to participate in this endeavor (along with preaching at our host church in Udonthani, and spending time with their pastor and resident missionaries), and thanks for supporting the UBC Foundation which is investing in theological education both here at home and abroad.

Foundation Scholarship Essays

The Foundation awarded \$2,000 scholarships to 5 students this year! Each year students write essays about their experience and involvement at UBC. We wanted to share some of their stories from those essays.

"Coming to UBC in ninth grade is one of the decisions that has most profoundly affected my spiritual growth and development in relationship with Christ and in understanding how to live as an example of Christ wherever I am. Ever since I joined UBC, the church has provided me with countless opportunities for spiritual growth and its members have poured into my life in ways that I can hardly describe. Not just in surface level ways, but in ways that say, "I care about you because God cares about you and I want to see you grown into the man that God created you to be." Whether that means having WBS teachers who come to band performances, a youth minister who "loves you" and "means it" with his actions and his words, or a mentor who invites me to go fishing and sit down for coffee on Friday mornings before school, the presence of God had surrounded me and enveloped me for four years through some amazing people."

"I grew up very differently from most Christians today. I was only in the church about three Sundays a year since my mother was Jewish and my dad did not have a relationship with God. My parents rarely ever talked about their beliefs. This caused me to go through my childhood without knowing much about the church or Christianity. In elementary school, I tried to fit in any way possible. I spent the first fourteen years of my life cursing and trying to the 'cool kid.' It wasn't until I met a girl with a true relationship with God that Jesus transformed my life.

I was invited to University Baptist Church (UBC) in 2015, and I was overwhelmed. The people at UBC didn't even know me, but they treated me like I belonged there. I was quickly encouraged to dive deep into questions about what I believed to be the truth. I couldn't discuss these questions with my parents, so I turned again to UBC. I posed questions to my youth minister, and one of the head pastors at the church, along with friends that had personal relationships with God. The love and wisdom that UBC and its entire Student Ministry shared with me allowed me to seek and find truth quickly. I was baptized, publicly professing my faith, after only eight months of searching."

"My heart was filled with joy from the love and support I felt as I gazed at the congregation on November 16, 2008. Little did I know, however, that Dr. Creech baptized me, God would continually shape me through UBC.

Before I was even born, my parents have taken me to UBC. Through their Sunday School, my parents developed friendships with five different couples. All six families have gone camping each year for the last fifteen years. As a result, I established strong friendships, and gained a number of adults who love and support me like my parents! Following my parents' example, I found my best friends at UBC. While we go to different high schools, we met through our love for Christ and UBC. Our friendship has grown through activities like Choir, Sunday School, Crave, and Merge. Thanks to UBC, I have both mentors and best friends, who strengthen my faith!"

"Our commission as believers is to further His kingdom here on Earth and I can now say that I desire that with all of my heart. I want to be an ambassador for Christ so that others can experience the fullness of life, real life, with Him. UBC has equipped me in so many ways to be a Christian leader in my community. Through events such as the Student Leadership Academy, a program in which we learned tools of being a leader and characteristics of good leadership through the lens of the Bible, and Apprentice Groups, a time in which I was given the opportunity to be a bible study leader, I have gained a foundation of Christian leadership. This Christ-filled confidence that I have gained within my community of believers, can be seen in my community at school as well. I help lead a Bible study at my school on Thursday mornings which is due to the foundation that UBC has helped give me.

I have learned so much about God's character over my time at UBC and He is still teaching me so much. I cannot thank UBC enough for playing such an active role in my life and for encouraging not only myself but all of their students to come to Christ with a heart fully abandoned for Him alone."

"Moving to Houston was initially hard. However, my parents decided to take me to UBC where I have met so many amazing people that have made this move easier. This church has made me want to be closer to God than I had ever wanted to before. My friends here at UBC really push me towards actively seeking Christ and bettering my relationship with God. They help me make decisions based on what God is telling me instead of what I want. In my Monday night girl group, I have been able to grow not only closer to God, but closer to my church friends. Being held accountable by this group makes me realize how far in my journey I have come during these last two years and it makes me excited for what God has in store for my future. This church has also displayed the characteristics of what God's church is supposed to be like. It has showed me how people should respond to differences in the church. It has proved that disagreements shouldn't get a person kicked out of church. That people will always be welcome despite differences."

"In high school, I was talked into trying a new camp UBC wanted to join called UM Army. I didn't really understand what we were going to be doing, but I trusted our leaders and signed up to go. When I arrived, I was immediately kicked out of my comfort zone and put with strangers. On Monday, my group started building a porch in the humid heat in July. God placed me in the most uncomfortable situation he could put me in. By Wednesday, I was convinced that I was not going to come back to UM Army. My group finished the remaining details on the porch and we presented it to our clients. They needed a safe way out of their home. The little old man came out of his house and walked out on the porch with a smile on his face. He was so grateful for his porch where he could watch birds fly by. This feeling of joy rushed over me. The rest of the week I began to have fun with my other group members. That week I felt God had called me to serve others in all aspects of my life."

UBC Foundation Report

The UBC Foundation (UBCF) has been busy funding scholarships and ministries. In addition, the Foundation had another successful Dine Out to Donate and will be hosting the Annual Golf Tournament on Monday, November 5.

STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS - \$12,000

A generous donation in 2017 enabled an increase in the number of student scholarship recipients from 4 to 5 and an increase in the amount of scholarships from \$1,600 to \$2,000 per student for 2018. The deserving recipients include: Cassidy Jordan, Katy Pyle, Evan Albright, Sara Vogel, Amaryst Wynn and David Pugh received the Bob Wall Orchestra Scholarship. Congratulations to these students!

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIPS - \$4,000

The Foundation is privileged to award the first two Ministerial Education Scholarships to Rachel Halloran and Josh Mobley, who will each receive \$2,000.

Rachel Halloran will be attending George W. Truett Theological Seminary and Baylor Law School pursuing a joint masters degree with Masters of Divinity and a Juris Doctorate. The degree takes 5-6 years to complete and is designed to bring together the skills needed to pursue a calling to advocacy, which in Rachel's case involves work with displaced refugees and immigrants.

Joshua Mobley will be attending Durham University in the United Kingdom to pursue a PhD program in theology. Upon completion of his degree, Josh plans to serve the church through the academic study of theology to deepen its faith and faithfulness through researching, writing and teaching at the university/ seminary level.

PASTOR CONFERENCE TRAVEL - \$3,000

Dr. Steve Laufer partnered with a Baptist church in Udon Thani, Thailand and the greater Southeast Asian Christian community this past June to provide a 3-day Pastor's theological conference. The conference provided education and training pertaining to the biblical interpretation, ministry application and preaching of the first five books of the Old Testament. Travel expenses for pastors from Thailand and Laos to attend was entirely funded by a grant from the UBC Foundation.

MERCY TREE LUNCHES - \$1,800

UBC hosts a local ministry called The Mercy Tree each Thursday for lunch. This is a feeding program with local homeless folks (12-24 people any given day). Aaron Glenn has developed a good relationship with the ministry leader, Gina Evans, and UBC has a dedicated group of 5-7 people who engage in this luncheon regularly. Aaron calls this a "ministry of presence" because volunteers and homeless clients sit and eat together and discuss important biblical and life themes. UBC Foundation will provide funding for lunches on Wednesdays.

CONTEMPORARY WORSHIP STAGE - \$4,500

Ben Sandstrom will be building a new stage set for the contemporary service to change up the visual aesthetic for worship. Ben has built all the previous sets and most current set by himself. The sets have to be transportable and able to set up in 10 minutes. It will be great to have something new to use in our worship services.

SPANISH SPEAKING INTERNS (SUMMER 2018) - \$3,000

Aaron Glenn identified two Spanish-speaking interns recommended through Baptist Student Ministries at UT Rio Grande Valley in McAllen with a geographical tie-in to our Buckner partnership. Each student received a stipend of \$1,000 with an additional \$100/week going to each host family to cover expenses. These college interns, Abel Santos and Gabriela Hernandez, helped UBC during VBS, Sports Camp, and Harvey Relief where they connected with Spanish-speaking individuals.

FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES

The Foundation held its 2nd annual Dine-Out-to-Donate event on May 21. With approximately nine local restaurants participating and a successful turnout, the Foundation raised over \$1,500.

The annual UBCF Golf Tournament will be held at Bay Oak Country Club on Monday, November 5, 2018 with a noon start time.

CRESCENDO INTERACTIVE

The Foundation is partnering with Crescendo Interactive to help launch the UBCF planned giving efforts. A new website is in the works and marketing materials will be created to educate UBC members regarding giving gifts through their estate plans.

Nominating Committee Report

2018 has been a busy and productive year for the nominating committee. We were tasked with filling twelve open positions. I am excited to announce that we have successfully filled nine of those positions to date.
